ARTIST'S SPOTLIGHT



Merri Chester

When she develops an interest, Merri Chester becomes passionate about it. As a child she was "horse crazy" but she couldn't indulge her interest until she was a young mother. Then she finally had the time and money to begin competitively riding hunters and jumpers. Soon she found that gaited Peruvian Pasos were even more interesting than dressage and that began a new love affair with that breed and style of riding. Eventually she specialized

in training other lady equestrians. All of this began to wind down before the pandemic and she retired her favorite horse after 25 years.

It became time to reinvent herself as she had before. Fellow rider and SWS member Tina Mewhinney encouraged her interest in painting. Early on she was using oils but she transitioned to watercolor because of its transparency,





the lack of noxious odors, and the ease of cleanup. She found the process of working from light to dark to be intuitive.

At first, Merri thought watercolor was difficult and she had just dabbled in it, but she rediscovered the medium during the pandemic and found it relaxing and therapeutic. It allowed her to take what's around her and create her own world. It was





a perfect outlet for her natural curiosity and quest for learning because the medium is difficult to control. No matter what you intended, at some point the water takes over and sends the piece down another path. She has learned to not consider that as a mistake but just a new direction. Rather than becoming frustrated, she discovered that with patience the painting will guide you. She finds it fun to wonder what will come next. She tries to get out of her own brain and experiment and play with possibilities.

At first finding the correct saturation of the paint was the most difficult challenge. All her colors were light with not enough dark values. She began developing better control of the water and also realized that she



likes paintings that leave viewers scratching their heads a little. The story doesn't need to be totally resolved. Artworks can make us think a bit, shake us up, even be a bit disturbing. Because she thinks this way, it is hard to see common denominator in the subjects she chooses. She just finds herself curious about a particular subject and decides to paint it. It may be beautiful or ugly (although they don't have to end up ugly). The fun is in experimenting with the idea and taking it where you don't know you are going.





With Merri, no subject is off the table as you can see in the images of her paintings. The surprising thing is that she doesn't paint horses. She still has a horse but she no longer rides competitively or trains other riders. She says that after all the horse years, she got that out of her system and now other things spark her fancy when she paints.

Between paintings, Merri waits for an idea to bubble to the surface on her mind before she starts something. She'd been feeling a bit stagnant until a recent trip with her husband to Mexico where she was able to walk on the beach and came back with a lot of reference photos. A lot of times she works from more than one photo to create something new. That can lead to complications because it can result in a confusing

composition. Merri enjoys finding ways to resolve those difficulties. Once she begins, she plows through until it is finished because she doesn't like to accept defeat, even with a painting. Now that she knows how to make modifications and corrections, even if she loses some of the initial freshness in the paint, she can often add richness when she makes adjustments.

One of the most important aspects of painting is knowing when to quit. When she is far enough along, she takes her piece from the painting shed into the house where she can look at it at night and see what needs to be adjusted. Living



"Oh, am I supposed to have goals?" asked Merri when questioned about what she is aiming for as an artist. She just paints because

she is curious about how an idea might work out. She wants to create paintings that look like they are by her. Life is full of wonder and beauty and she wants to capture some of it. Travel and other experiences offer possible subjects. So many people are goal driven and make step-by-step plans but she says her mind doesn't work that way. Instead, she just starts and sees where something takes her. She did that with riding and now she is doing that with painting. It promises to be fun to watch.

Jane Jones To Discuss "Creative Drawing through Design" in May

Jane Jones, teacher for decades of watercolor students and the author (along with Linda B. Franklin) of Creativity Through Design: A Step-by-Step to Better Composition, will be the presenter at the SWS May membership meeting. She is a respected teacher of design, color and creative thinking and has been teaching for 48 years. She has taught workshops worldwide. Jane is listed in "Who's Who of American Women." Jane has participated in many group and one woman exhibitions, and in many corporate and private collections. She is a signature status in many national watercolor juried societies including NWS and SWS. Jane works in all media, watercolor, acrylic, collage, and mixed media. She is the designer of three watercolor palettes and she and Linda Franklin will soon have a second book, Creativity through Color.

Jane's paintings are quite Impressionistic and abstract in Watercolor and she also creates Non-Representational paintings in Acrylic. She also uses mixed media, mainly collage, which allows her to explore Design.

Jane's abstract watercolors are painted from photos. She superimposes something from nature onto the real and then plays the game of real versus abstract. Her non-representational paintings are from her imagination. The reason she paints is I try to capture the essence of nature when she is working in plein air. The non-representational paintings are expressions of her inner self. She



enjoys the challenge of trying to resolve the chaos she has initially created into a satisfactory resolution. She is always searching for a new way of expressing herself.

Don't miss the May meeting when SWS will benefit from the long established expertise of one of a key member of our society. In addition to the presentation by Jane Jones, we will be installing the new officers and recognizing the contributions of all our leaders past and present. He will also share his experience with breaking free from the tyranny of the reference photo, encouraging a more creative and satisfying painting experience. Emphasis will be on creating better paintings through an understanding of the importance of wellconsidered value relationships, meaningful color decisions and brushwork that delights and entertains the eye.

Students will gain a better understanding of the power of simplicity through a preliminary process of letting go. Daily demonstrations will allow the students to see how Tom approaches a painting from start to finish. Exercises aimed at helping students better understand certain concepts will also be employed.

Soon Young Warren Big Hit at SWS

Immensely entertaining as well as being informative, Soon Y. Warren's demonstration and workshop got rave reviews. She is most known for her dramatic high contrast still-life paintings in a photographic style and she discussed how she does them. In addition to creating stunning paintings, Soon's quips and stories are very enjoyable.

Soon Warren explained that her paintings are done with layer on top of layer and so it would be very tedious to watch her paint. Instead, she discussed her painting process.

Soon Warren's paintings are based on reference photos she has taken. She often sets up objects that interest her and lights them. Other times she sees something in passing that captivates her and then snaps photos of that. She jokes that she has been known to trespass or go where she hasn't been invited if it will give her a better vantage point for a possible subject.

Soon says she doesn't care about color theory because she can always change a color or shape if she decides it isn't right. She doesn't bother with value or color studies because her experience drawing from a young age has helped her to understand how shapes work. Now she never draws anything because she is sick of drawing. Instead, she traces the shapes from the photos and then uses a projector to scale them up. That saves time so she can get to the painting part.

Initially, she applies colors loosely and then glazes over the different areas to define and enrich the

colors. When the undercoat dries, she paints a flower petal by petal. As she applies color to the different parts of the painting, she keeps in hand small reference photos so that she can keep track of the part of the composition where she is working as her brush moves from shape to shape. She prefers to paint glazes of color over other colors because they mix optically but the layers also shine through.



Watercolor is Soon Warren's medium of choice because the water does half the work in the painting. With oil paintings the artist is in control; with watercolor, the artist has to follow the water and persuade the water to do what they'd like. She says she never paints a photo exactly. She starts with the photo she likes but then things happen and she must follow the painting where it goes.
